Women's History Month

March is Women's History Month, with International Women's Day falling on March 8. This began as a national celebration in 1981 when Congress passed the bill to request that the President proclaim the week beginning with March 7, 1982 as "Women's History Week." Later, the National Women's History Project petitioned to designate the month of March 1987 as "Women's History Month." This is a time to commemorate and encourage the study, observance, and celebration of the vital role of women in American and World History.

Every year, the National Women's History Alliance designates an annual theme for Women's History Month. For the 2021 celebration, the theme is "Valiant Women of the Vote: Refusing to be Silenced." This theme recognizes the battle for women's suffrage, which was achieved with the passing of the 19th Amendment in 1920. Countless women fought, demonstrated, and petitioned that women, like men, deserve the right to vote as citizens of the United States.

Ways to celebrate Women's History Month include, but are not limited to, educating yourself on women's history in America, staying aware of the issues women all over the world still face today, spreading awareness on social media platforms, supporting a women's non-profit organization, and buying from women-owned businesses.
